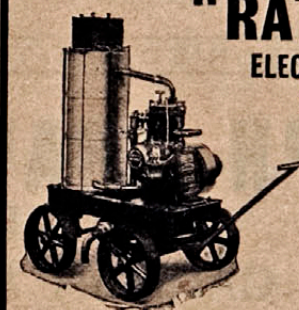

* Printed packets prepaid one halfpenny only and intended for despatch on the day of posting must be posted not later than 4.30 p.m. in London, or in the Provinces, not later than such time as may be announced in the Post Office window notices. The minimum rate of postage for all packets sent at the Printed Paper Rate, and intended for despatch by the night mail, is one penny, if posted after the specified time.

No *Inland* letter packet may exceed 2 ft. by 1 ft. by 1 ft. In roll form, 30 in. in length by 4 in. in diameter.

(2) IMPERIAL AND FOREIGN LETTERS.—To the British Empire generally (excluding Iraq and Transjordan), to H.M. Ships of War abroad, Egypt, United States of America, and the British Post Office at Tangier, 1 1/4d. for the first oz., and 1d. each oz. after.

To all other places (including Iraq and Transjordan), 2 1/4d. for the first oz. and 1 1/4d. for each additional oz.
As regards H.M. Troops serving abroad see the Post Office Guide.

POSTCARDS.—Single, 1 1/4d.; reply paid, 3d. No letter packet for the Empire or Egypt may exceed 2 ft. in length by 18 in. in width or depth. For Foreign countries the limit of size is 18 in. in any direction. Letters in the form of a roll may not in either case exceed 30 in. in length by 4 in. in diameter. Maximum weight 4 lb. in all cases.

AIR MAIL.—Any kind of letter packet may be sent by Air Mail. Parcels may also be sent to certain countries. The limits of size and maximum weight are the same as for similar correspondence sent by ordinary service. Full information regarding Air Mail services for letters and parcels is published in the Air Mail leaflet which may be obtained at any Post Office. The rates of air postage are as follows: *European Countries*: First ounce 4d., each additional ounce 3d., postcards 2 1/4d.

INLAND PRINTED PAPERS.—Books and other publications or works of a literary character, sketches, drawings, paintings, photographic prints, engravings, maps, plans, charts, and any other printed or written matter not in the nature of a letter, and printed or written on paper or some substance ordinarily used for printing or writing, may be transmitted at the inland Printed Paper rate.

The following documents are transmissible provided they conform to the regulations and consist of a form bearing printed matter (not in imitation of typewriting) clearly indicating the purpose for which it is intended to be used, and that any writing refer solely to its subject matter, or consist of formulas of courtesy or of a conventional character not exceeding five words or initials: Invoices, Orders for goods, or for work, Confirmations of orders, Advice notes of the despatch or receipt of letters, documents, goods or money, Way-bills, Bills of lading, Receipts for goods or money, Statements of account, Price lists, Prices current, Market reports, Delivery and shipping notes, Quotations for goods, Tenders for goods or for advertisements, Estimates for work, Inquiries for quotations, Contract notes, Confirmations of contracts, Applications for employment, and Share transfer notices.

Deeds, agreements, affidavits, orders of court, briefs from solicitor to counsel, proposals and policies of insurance and formal papers necessarily incident to insurance, powers of attorney, proxy papers, voting papers, testimonials, certificates and licences, on condition that nothing appear in the document in writing which does not form a necessary part thereof. POSTAL RATES, &c.—contd.

Christmas, New Year, Easter, birthday, picture, greeting and visiting cards.

(By "printing" is meant any species of type-printing easy to recognise; imitation type-written circulars are included if identical in text so far as the portion printed or reproduced in imitation of typewriting is concerned and provided not less than 20 packets are specially handed in at a Post Office and attention called to their nature. "Writing" includes type-writing.)

No packet may exceed 2 ft. in length, 1 ft. in width or depth; in roll form 30 in. in length by 4 in. in diameter. Packets must be posted either without covers, or in unfastened covers, or in covers which can be easily removed for the purpose of examination without breaking any seal or tearing any paper or separating any adhering surfaces, or cutting any string.

INLAND SAMPLE POST.—Rates: Not exceeding 4 oz., 1d. (minimum). Between 4 oz. and 6 oz., 1 1/4d. Between 6 oz. and 8 oz., 2d. (Maximum). The limits of size and weight are:—Length 12 ins., width 8 ins., depth 4 ins., weight 8 oz.

BUSINESS REPLY CARDS AND ENVELOPES.—Under this service business firms may issue with their circulars cards or envelopes for their clients' replies without prepayment of postage—the postage (in addition to a charge of 1/4d.) being paid by the firm only on the replies which reach them.

IMPERIAL AND FOREIGN PACKETS.—Packets of Printed or Commercial Papers, not in the form of a roll, addressed to a British Dominion, Colony or Possession may not exceed 2 ft. in length and 1 1/2 ft. in width or depth; for Foreign countries and Egypt the dimensions may not exceed 18 in. in any direction. Packets in the form of a roll may not, in either case, exceed 30 in. in length and 4 in. in diameter. The limit of weight for the British Empire is 5 lb., and for Foreign countries and Egypt 4 lb. Exceptionally, printed volumes for any destination sent singly may weigh as much as 6 1/4 lb. Rates of postage: Printed Papers—1/4d. per 2 oz.; Commercial papers, 2 1/4d. for the first 10 oz. or under, and 3 1/4d. per 2 oz. thereafter.

Magazine Post for Canada and Newfoundland.—The postage on duly registered British Newspapers, Magazines, and Trade Journals intended for despatch to Canada by direct steamship and to Newfoundland by direct steamship or via Canada by direct steamship is:—

Not over 2 oz., 1/4d.; 6 oz., 1d.; 1 1/2 lb., 1 1/4d.; 2 lb., 2d.; 2 1/2 lb., 2 1/2d.; 3 lb., 3d.; 3 1/2 lb., 3 1/2d.; 4 lb., 4d.; 4 1/2 lb., 4 1/2d.; 5 lb., 5d.

(1) INLAND PARCELS.—No parcel may exceed 11 lb. in weight; dimensions allowed: maximum length, 3 ft. 6 in.; maximum length and girth combined, 6 ft. Subject to certain rules, compensation is given up to £2 for loss or damage of an unregistered parcel. A certificate of posting should be obtained.

(2) Imperial and Foreign Parcels can be sent to most Countries. The rates of postage, weight and size, differ for different countries, and inquiry should in all cases be made at a Post Office, or particulars ascertained from the Post Office Guide, sold at any Post Office at 1/-

INLAND CASH ON DELIVERY.—The value of unregistered parcels and of registered packets (including parcels) sent by post is collected on delivery. Cash on Delivery fees (in addition to ordinary postage and registration), are as follows:—Trade Charge not exceeding 10s., 4d.; £1, 6d.; £2, 8d.; £5, 10s.; and 2d. for each additional £5 or fraction of £5, up to the maximum of £40.

POSTAL RATES, &c.—contd.

By arrangement with Railway Companies, the value of goods sent by rail to places in Great Britain may be collected by means of a C.O.D. registered letter containing a document entitling addressee to take delivery of goods.

REGISTRATION.—*Inland*—The minimum fee for each inland letter, parcel, or other postal packet is 3d. This must be prepaid in addition to the ordinary postage, and the packet handed to an officer of the Post Office, and a receipt obtained. No packet intended for registration may be dropped into a letter box. Compensation for loss is granted in accordance with the registration fee paid. Fee: 3d. for £5; 4d. for £20; and at the rate of 1d. for each additional £20 up to £400. A registered packet must be made up in a reasonably strong cover appropriate to its contents, and must be fastened with wax, gum, or other adhesive matter; if containing money and compensation is desired in the event of loss, one of the registered letter envelopes sold by the Post Office must be used. These are in five sizes. The maximum amount of compensation for the loss of coin is £5. Packets containing fragile articles should be conspicuously marked "Fragile, with care." Packets which contain coin or jewellery, if posted unregistered, are subjected to compulsory registration, and are charged on delivery with a fee of 6d., less any amount prepaid in excess of the postage.

INLAND TELEGRAM RATES.—The charge for any message of 12 words throughout the United Kingdom is 1/- (1/6 for telegrams addressed to the Irish Free State), and 1d. for each additional word. Figures are counted at the rate of five figures to a word.

CERTIFICATES OF POSTING FOR UNREGISTERED PACKETS OTHER THAN PARCELS.—Any person who desires proof that an unregistered letter, letter-card, post-card, printed paper, newspaper, commercial paper or sample packet, has been posted to a particular person should hand in the letter or other article at a Post Office and ask for a certificate of posting. The fee is 1/4d.

LETTER CARDS.—2d. each; 1/6 a packet of 10.

POST CARDS.—*Inland*—Postage 1d. Cards sold at Post Offices: Single (thin) 1 1/4d.; (stout) 1 1/2d.; reply 2 1/4d. Packet of 11 cards: Single (thin) 1/-; reply 2/-. Packet of 10 cards: Single (stout) 1/-. For *Abroad*—Postage (for all destinations) 1 1/4d.; reply 3d. Cards sold at Post Offices: Single 1 1/4d.; reply 3 1/4d.

PRIVATE CARDS.—May be used with 1d. or 1 1/4d. stamp affixed to the face of the card. They must be of cardboard closely resembling the official card. They may not exceed 5 1/2 by 4 1/2 inches, or be less than 4 by 2 1/2 inches in size.

NEWSPAPERS.—*Inland*—The inland Newspaper rate, which is a rate per copy, is 1d. for the first 6 oz., together with a further charge of 1/4d. for every additional 6 oz. or fraction thereof, but a packet containing several copies may be prepaid at the Inland Printed Paper rate if that is cheaper. Every newspaper should be so folded that the title may easily be read, and must be posted either without a cover, or in one open at both ends, so as to admit of easy removal for examination. Nothing in the nature of a letter may be written on the newspaper or its cover. No newspaper or packet of newspapers may exceed 2 lb.

By arrangement with Railway Companies, the value of goods sent by rail to places in Great Britain may be collected by means of a C.O.D. registered letter containing a document entitling addressee to take delivery of goods.

SMALL PACKETS.—*Imperial and Foreign*.—This service is intended to afford facilities for the transmission of small articles of merchandise in the letter mails, and is limited to certain countries only (for full list see Post Office Guide). The rate of postage is 1 1/4d. per 2 oz., with a minimum charge of 6d. Maximum dimensions: 18 in. by 8 in. by 4 in., or in roll form, 18 in. in length by 6 in. in diameter. Limit of weight, 2 lb. A green label, giving particulars of the contents for Customs purposes, must be affixed to each packet, and in addition, if the country of destination so requires, one or more ordinary non-adhesive Customs Declaration Forms must be enclosed in the packet (see Post Office Guide).

SAMPLE POST.—*Imperial and Foreign*.—This is restricted to bona fide trade samples, without saleable value, and to scientific specimens, etc. The rate of postage is 1/4d. per 2 oz., but lowest charge is 1d., for which 4 oz. may be sent. Limit of weight, British Dominions, Colonies or Possessions, Egypt, 5 lb.; to Foreign Countries in the Postal Union, except Egypt, the limit is 1 lb. Limits of size: To Foreign countries in the Postal Union, except Egypt, 18 in. by 8 in. by 4 in.; or, if in form of roll, 18 in. in length with diameter of 6 in. To all other destinations, 2 ft. in length by 1 ft. in width or depth.

EXPRESS DELIVERY SERVICES.—There are five express delivery services, namely—Service I.—By Special Messenger all the way; Service II.—By Special Messenger after transmission by post; Service III.—By Special Delivery in advance of the ordinary mail; Service IV.—Express Delivery on Sundays; Service V.—By Special Messenger after transmission by telephone. For full particulars of these Services the Post Office Guide should be consulted. For Service I., fees to be paid in stamps affixed to a form at the Post Office, the word "Express" written above the address in the left hand corner of the cover, and Packets handed in over the counter of the office from which they are to be despatched.

REDUCED EXTRA-EUROPEAN TELEGRAPH RATES.

Deferred telegrams at half rates and Night and Daily letter telegrams at further reduced rates can be sent to nearly all the British Overseas Dominions and to many other places outside Europe. Such telegrams must be written entirely in plain language. Deferred telegrams are not subject to any specified delay and take precedence over all letter telegrams. Their time of transmission depends on the volume of higher-rate traffic. Daily letter telegrams are normally delivered on the next morning but one after the day of handing in. Night letter telegrams are normally delivered on the morning of the day following that of handing in. A Post Letter Telegram service is also available by certain routes to Canada, Newfoundland and St. Pierre and Miquelon. Such messages are handled as telegrams across the Atlantic but are collected and delivered as letters.

The rates of Estate Duty which were originally imposed by the Finance Act, 1894, were altered in 1907, 1909, 1914, 1919, 1925, and 1930 by the Finance Acts of those years.

All property passing by death has to be aggregated for the purpose of ascertaining the rate of duty, but this rule is subject to certain qualifications. The principal qualifying provisions are as follows:—

- (1) Where property passes in which the deceased never had an interest, and
 - (2) Where the net value of the property passing on the death (exclusive of property settled otherwise than by the will of the deceased) does not exceed £1,000.
- In the above cases the property so passing is not aggregated with any other property but forms an "estate by itself."

[In the case of deaths before May 12th, 1914, where property liable to Estate Duty is settled by the will of the deceased, or having been settled by some other disposition, passes under that disposition, on the death of the deceased, to some person not competent to dispose thereof, a further duty—called Settlement Estate Duty—is payable at the rate of £2 per cent. on the settled property, but from that payment the *ad. val.* Stamp Duty (if any) charged on the settlement may be deducted.

If, however, Estate Duty becomes payable a second time under the same settlement, the Settlement Estate Duty already paid is allowed for.]

SMALL ESTATES—(i.) If the net value of the property, real and personal, passing on the deceased's death (exclusive of property settled otherwise than by the will of the deceased) does not exceed

INLAND REVENUE DUTIES—contd.

£1,000, such property is exempt from Legacy or Succession Duty under the will or intestacy of the deceased. (ii.) And where the gross value of the unsettled property passing on the deceased's death does not exceed £300 or £500 respectively, and a grant of probate or administration is taken out in a certain special manner, a fixed Duty of 30/- or 50/- is payable, and such estate is exempt from all other Death Duties, as passing on the deceased's death.

With respect to Personal Estate, interest at 3 per cent. per annum, without deduction for Income Tax, is also payable on the Estate Duty from the date of the death up to the date of the delivery of the affidavit.

The Estate Duty on real property may be paid, if desired, by eight yearly or sixteen half-yearly instalments, the first at the expiration of 12 months from the death, with interest at 3 per cent. per annum without deduction for Income Tax, from the last-mentioned date on the duty for the time being unpaid. On a sale the duty for the time being unpaid becomes payable at once.

Where, however, the interest accrued between the 30th July, 1919, and the 26th April, 1930, the rate is 4½% without deduction for Income Tax.

In the case of deaths on or after the 30th June, 1925, the Estate Duty payable in respect of agricultural property is charged on the agricultural value of the property at the appropriate rate under the scale of rates in the Finance Act, 1919. The amount by which the principal value of the agricultural property exceeds the agricultural value thereof (called "the excess principal value") is charged in the case of persons dying on or after the 30th June, 1925 and before the 1st August, 1930, at the appropriate rate under the scale in the Finance Act, 1925, and in the case of persons dying on or after the 1st August, 1930, at the appropriate rate under the scale in the Finance Act, 1930.

LEGACY AND SUCCESSION DUTIES—ALSO SEE "ESTATE DUTY."

Rates of Duty.—The Husband or Wife, the Children or their Descendants, or the Father or Mother or other Lineal Ancestor of the Testator, &c., £1 per cent.; Brothers and Sisters or their Descendants, £5 per cent.; Persons in any other degree of collateral Consanguinity, or Strangers in Blood, £10 per cent. A Legatee or Beneficiary, whose Husband or Wife is of nearer Relationship, is chargeable with Duty at the rate at which such Husband or Wife would be chargeable. Relations of the Husband or Wife of the Testator, &c., are chargeable with Duty at £10 per cent. unless themselves related in blood to the Testator, &c. Appraisements or Valuations of any Property made for the purpose of ascertaining the Legacy Duty payable in respect thereof are exempt from Stamp Duty.

If, however, Estate Duty is not payable, the rates of Succession Duty are 1½, 6½ and 11½% respectively.

The rates of Legacy and Succession Duty were last altered by the Finance (1909-1910) Act, 1910.

The Husband, Wife and Lineal Ancestors and Descendants of the Testator, &c., are still exempt in Estates not exceeding £15,000 in value.

In Estates exceeding that figure the Wife or minor Child of the Testator, &c., is exempt if the individual benefit does not exceed £2,000 and other Children if the benefit does not exceed £1,000 derived from the same Testator, &c.

PAYING THE SCHOOL FEES

By H. S. KING.

IN most middle-class families the time comes when a son or daughter reaches the age at which the choice of a "good" school becomes urgent. And equally urgent then becomes the need to find the wherewithal to pay the fees. Lack of that wherewithal may disappoint the fond hopes of father and mother.

There is a ready way of insuring that funds shall be available when required. By means of an insurance policy taken out when the child is, say, two, you can secure the payment of more than £100 a year for five years, from the time he is twelve years old.

When that time arrives you may prefer to receive a smaller yearly payment in order to leave a good round sum available to give him a start in business or in one of the professions. That can be arranged.

You can choose either of two types of policy. By one, you insure the child's life. By the other, you insure your own.

The first would cost about £43 a year, or £34 if you start when your child is born. For an additional yearly payment of less than £2 the insurance company would arrange for premiums to cease should you die before the income starts. You might therefore have paid the company only £45 and still the cost of your child's education would in due course be met.

This possibility of premature death of the parent, impels me to recommend the second type of policy.

Suppose you are aged thirty. You take out a policy on your own life and pay the company £46 a year. And here is an important point: you can claim rebate of income tax, whereas on a policy of the first type you cannot. That reduces your actual yearly outlay—reckoning at present income tax rates—to about £40. In ten years' time the company would pay £107 a year for five years, or £500 cash down. Still more important: if anything should happen to you, not only would there be nothing more to pay but the £500 would be handed over immediately.

You may, however, decide that a yearly outlay of £40 is more than you can afford, especially if you are already insured for a substantial sum. You can still do something for your child. For an outlay of £10 a year, from the time he is two, you can secure a cash payment of about £260 when he is twenty-one. If he then chooses to continue the insurance he can arrange for the payment of £1000 whenever he dies, or he can have £560 at forty, £940 at sixty, or sums varying in amount, according to age, in between. And in each case considerable additions would be made, by way of bonus, to the sums payable.

In this last type of policy, if the child should die before he is twenty-one all the premiums received by the company would be handed back to you, without interest.

Have you put his name down?

Nowadays, if you desire your child to go to a Public School you must put his name down early. Some schools have a waiting-list eight or ten years ahead.

You may have put your boy's name down but not have made definite provision for payment of the necessary fees.

Or it may be you have refrained because you foresee financial difficulties.
